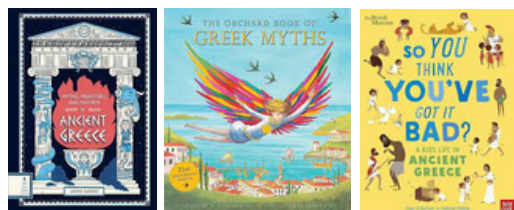


YEAR 6

Spring 1: Ancient Greece



HISTORY

Children will learn what everyday life was like in Ancient Greece, including entertainment and education. They will understand how society was organised and how it differed for different groups of people. Children will learn about key philosophies from Ancient Greece which still affect us today, with particular focus on parliament and democracy.

ART: SCULPTURE

Children explore how Ancient Greek artists used sculpture to represent the ideal human. They draw on their own research to create complex 3D forms.

ENGLISH

Narrative (extended): Greek myth (Spring 1)

Fiction (short): Windrush diary entry (Spring 2)

Non-fiction: Instructions (e.g. linked to Ancient Greece) & newspaper report (e.g. Windrush)

Poetry - limerick (e.g. Greek gods/heroes/mythical creatures)

MATHS

Ratio - use ratio language, calculate ratio, use the ratio symbol, use and calculate scale factors and solve ratio and proportion problems.

Algebra - form expressions, understand substitution and formulae and solve simple two-step equations.

Decimals - multiply and divide by 10, 100 and 1000 and convert fractions to decimals.

Fractions, decimals and percentages - find equivalent fractions, decimals and percentages and find percentages of amounts.

Area, perimeter and volume - find the area of a triangle and parallelogram and find the volume of a cuboid.

Spring 2: The Windrush



GEOGRAPHY

Children understand the push and pull factors which led to people migrating from the Caribbean to the UK after WW2. They learn about the significant contributions of the Windrush generation to post-war London, including the impact on the built environment in our local area. They understand the resulting interdependence of geography and identity.

D&T: STRUCTURES

Children use their own research to design and make a stable structure that responds to the needs of the Windrush community and the physical and natural features of the existing environment.
